FutuResilience, looking forward

The project has come to an end... or almost. We still have a few more weeks ahead of us, including one key public milestone: the **launch of the FutuResilience Policy Roadmap**. This core strategic guide sets out recommendations for advancing knowledge valorisation and strengthening societal resilience, with a strong emphasis on anticipatory policymaking.

A fitting and celebratory moment to mark this journey was our final project event. Hosted by the Estonian Parliament, it offered an opportunity to reflect, exchange and celebrate together, bringing partners, policymakers and stakeholders around the table after three years of shared experimentation and learning. The discussions reaffirmed the value of the work carried out across our labs and underscored the importance of collective, forward-looking approaches to building societal resilience. These learnings, together with a broader impact analysis, are captured in our recently launched Impact Report, which highlights the project's key achievements, insights and lasting contributions.

As the project draws to a close, we are confident that its results will continue to inform policy, practice, and collaboration well beyond its lifetime, including through ongoing engagement with European projects and initiatives aligned with wider policy ambitions. This is not a goodbye, but a "see you soon" — as the journey towards resilient, future-ready societies continues ...

FutuResilience final event

The FutuResilience Final Event, held on 2nd and 3rd December 2025 at the Estonian Parliament. gathered policymakers, researchers and practitioners for two days of debate on knowledge valorisation, societal resilience and anticipatory governance. In opening the meeting, the Member of Parliament for the Estonian Social Democratic Party, Riina Sikkut, stressed the importance of forward-looking policymaking in an era of complex and interconnected crises, providing the backdrop for keynote interventions [Tonurist Piret (OECD), Michal Miedzinski (JRC) and Iphigenia Pottaki (European Commission, DG RTD)] on anticipatory innovation, place-based policy and EU knowledge valorisation strategies. The project coordinatorm Matias Barberis. presented the project's main achievements, from emerging knowledge valorisation archetypes to the resilience profiles

developed across the FutuResilience. The event closed with a shared understanding that resilience is not a final goal, but an evolving practice rooted in openness, participation and long-term vision, offering a strong foundation for future initiatives to help societies deal with uncertainty and changes
